Arboreal Abstractions

The end of March is already at hand and repotting should be near complete, but I am not yet done thinking or writing about it. I could write extensively about repotting – or root work more broadly – and never exhaust the importance of the activity. I am so rapt by the subject currently because of the contrast between how little attention it receives versus how important it is.

This lack of attention is due to multiple factors. First, root work is only performed during a relatively small window and not every year at that. Second, it involves the part of the plant we do not see (most of the time). Third, most of the pre-bonsai material I have come across has received a criminally small or non-existent amount of root work. Many sellers command premium pre-bonsai prices for trees pruned in a nursery container with unworked roots. Fourth, just like trees with suboptimal trunk lines, the more time that goes by on a tree with misaligned roots, the harder it becomes to correct. Fifth, root work is hard. The list goes on.

To be fair, I have learned to evaluate rootage from my teachers. This is less of a critique of pedagogy as it is an observation of the conversation at large. What's missing is context: the why, when, and how of root work. Like many topics in this artistic pursuit, we are often careening down a slope of techniques and concepts, grasping for what is relevant along the way. Context is so important for knowledge.

Why then is root work so important?

First, good nebari is half of the composition. Ok, maybe it's a third of the composition. Or is it 9/16? Whatever the ratio is, the amount of time and energy spent in instruction should be commensurate.

Second, root work must be started early. Unless the grower has employed girdling or root mounting techniques to form radial, perpendicular nebari, drastic cuts are often necessary. This translates to more time until a tree is show-ready.

Third, root work happens during repotting. Repotting – or initial potting – is the moment when a tree takes its biggest step to becoming bonsai. This is the moment when we either begin a composition by moving a tree into a training pot and carefully positioning it. Or it is the moment when we complete a composition, insofar as a bonsai can be "completed." It is the moment when we make a bonsai show ready by moving it into a pot which meets our aesthetic vision. I can prune my maple seedlings for years on end, developing fat, dynamic trunks, but they will never be bonsai sitting in cloth grow bags. They become bonsai only after being wed with a beautiful pot.

Evaluating Bonsai in Show Exhibits - Jonas Dupuich Tuesday March 26

This coming Tuesday evening March 26 we welcome Jonas Dupuich for his presentation and discussion around Evaluating Bonsai in Show Exhibits. This will be an interactive meeting, so members are strongly encouraged to bring more developed specimens for discussion. These do not need to be perfectly show ready trees, so newer members in particular should consider bringing in a tree. While the idea is not to harshly critique trees, members should be prepared to receive valuable feedback about their bonsai relative to the winning characteristics judges look for in formal shows. The timing of this presentation is great for receiving feedback to dial in your submissions for our spring show as well as for the Pacific Bonsai Expo. Entries for the ABAS spring show are due April 11 while the deadline for Pacific Bonsai Expo is April 30.

With decades of experience, Jonas is a bonsai nursery owner and operates the website and blog: 'Bonsai Tonight.' When done correctly, this marriage of tree and pot is when the composition exceeds the sum of the parts. It is the moment of selecting pottery which compliments or contrasts our subject in color, texture, or form. It is the moment of emphasizing bulky mass or an ethereal grace, grounding the composition or pushing it towards instability, creating harmony or dissonance.

Bonsai is the *potting of trees* after all, so why are we not pounding our fists on the table at the profound importance of the moment when tree and pot meet? And why are we not demanding higher quality roots from our suppliers?.

What to Work on March

Most re-potting should be complete for this year. Trees are budding out and beginning major spring growth. The primary work for early spring is fertilizing conifers and pinching new growth on species that require control of elongating foliage such as Japanese Maples. Refer to the 'Yearly Care Calendars' on our website 'Member Resources' page. New growth is very tender and easily damaged so this is not a good time for wiring. Weeds, weeds, weeds! Last Meeting - Bonsai Structural Development

We thank Peter Tea for his presentation at our last meeting Tuesday February 27 on bonsai structural development. Peter has been advancing the concept of sequential tree development, with an emphasis on learning to read and design a tree from oldest to youngest tissue, starting with the primary trunk line. Learning to read a tree from the bottom-up is the most efficient way to develop great lines without wasting energy on irrelevant portions of the tree.

Peter's talk was supported by excellent examples of highly developed and in-progress trees from his collection, illustrating the outcomes of sequential development. By learning to prioritize development of primary lines, the student can begin to recognize when existing branching is not usable and to get to the necessary but drastic cuts faster. Learning to not be attached to existing branching when it is suboptimal is challenging for students as it takes great imagination to see past it. He concluded the evening by performing cuts on a trident maple to carry the point home. Congratulations to Paul Holtzen for winning this maple!

Dig In and Chop In Roger Steel

Dig In and Chop In classes are underway. Concepts covered in Dig In are material selection, intro to tools and materials, and basic styling. Chop In is the intermediate course after Dig In in which students are given styling suggestions, but perform the work independently. More advanced techniques are also taught. We had nine students at the Dig In # 7 class on March 9 taught by Roger Steel and Bill Burns. During their field trip to Green Acres this class was bold and came away with some impressive nursery bonsai material. Several of their choices will be showing up at our shows in the near future.

The attached pictures are of an air layer Bill did to demonstrate the technique on the main trunk. One of the students was then tasked with doing the same on a side branch. Air Layering is a truly great skill to move these students toward larger bonsai material. The second pictures are the before and after of a forsythia. The tree was worked on collectively by the students with dramatic results. After that one student was tasked with doing a thread graft. Of course this bonsai will be cut down further in time as the size of the bonsai will feature more blooms closer to the base. This was a great class.
