Arboreal Abstractions

Peak repotting is upon us. As I hustle to repot everything in my garden that needs to stretch its legs, the critical nature of root work has revealed itself more than ever. It's perhaps one of the more daunting things to learn for someone without a background in horticulture, but it's one of my favorite activities. It is literally the foundation of our tree and should be treated as such.

Bonsai is of course a constellation of different skills together as one and each skill set is its own rabbit hole. Artistic design is pruning, pot selection, display design, tree angle, etc. Horticulture on the other hand is repotting, pruning, light and water management, pest control etc. These are intricately linked together and there is a near infinite spectrum of ability to be attained in each.

Bonsai is this set of skills, but maximally refined and improved. We aren't just repotting; we are designing a display, selecting fine pottery, screening and mixing potting media, carefully arranging particle size for best drainage and aeration for root respiration, and thoughtfully placing the tree in the best position and angle. We aren't just pruning; we are looking decades into the future while considering the growth habit of the species, allowing light into the lower canopy, improving airflow, and defining negative space. Along each of these axes we strive to improve our skills and delve deeper into the nuanced technique of bonsai.

Yet much attention is spent on the visible upper half of the plant relative to the other half. Root work and repotting is arguably more important than shoot work, but it takes a backseat during presentations and discussions. Roots are literally the foundation of the plant, the mechanical attachment of the plant to the earth — or to our carefully screened potting media mix.

Visual inspection of roots can provide a great deal of information about the health of the plant, vigor, pest, and pathogen status. A root mealy bug infestation will not be known until your plant shows symptoms or you inspect the root zone. In my life as a greenhouse manager, when diagnosing a plant, one of the first things I do is pop it out of the pot. Casual inspection isn't possible when our trees are properly secured to the pot, but removing the wire to allow root inspection should always be an option if you suspect root issues. Many advanced practitioners will repot a new acquisition regardless of the need, in order to fully understand its status.

Design-wise, regular and early root work is critical to developing nebari and good design overall. It is far easier and more beneficial to do good root work early in the development process, just like developing the primary trunk line. Fixing bad roots only becomes more difficult with time.

Repotting time provides an opportunity to learn the advanced techniques that make the perceived magic of bonsai possible, so my advice is to embrace it. Repotting and root work are also critical levers that slow down plant growth, so don't be reckless, learn from someone with experience, and keep good notes. But don't be scared either of freeing your trees from their pots and spending much needed time working root structure.

Bonsai Structural Development - Peter Tea Tuesday February 27

Our coming meeting on Tuesday February 27 will feature a presentation from Peter Tea on bonsai structural development. This presentation is not to be missed. Peter has been advancing the concept of sequential tree development through recent talks he has given. The idea is deceptively simple, yet profound and will benefit newcomers and seasoned artists alike. Peter emphasizes learning to read and design a tree from oldest to youngest tissue, starting with the primary trunk line. Learning to read a tree from the bottom-up, as opposed to our western (and beginner) tendency to read from the top-down, is the most efficient way to develop great lines without wasting energy on irrelevant portions of the tree.

Peter started his bonsai career in 2001 and served as a board member and president of Midori Bonsai Club for several years. In 2003 he commenced a 3-year intensive training program with Boon Manakitivipart. In 2011, Peter traveled to Nagoya, Japan to complete an apprenticeship under Junichiro Tanaka at Aichien Bonsai Garden. He returned to California in 2013 to become a full time bonsai artist and instructor. Today, he is a key figure in bonsai and bonsai education providing a complete care, materials, and instruction tailored to each client and tree.

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
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Last Meeting - Demystifying Automatic Irrigation for Bonsai

Last month, I had the pleasure of leading a discussion on setting up automatic irrigation for bonsai during our January meeting. It was a fruitful discussion and audience engagement was high, which is every presenter's dream. We carefully threaded the needle of understanding that there is more than one way to solve for auto irrigation, while zooming in on key considerations to setting up an effective automatic irrigation system. We also looked at specific examples of how members have already set up irrigation and shared hard-earned wisdom with folks looking to set up a new system or rebuild an existing one.

As with everything, the best place to start is with goals and the same was true with our irrigation discussion. The amount of effort to build a system that provides infrequent vacation watering is far less than trying to build a system that waters daily with the same level of care and detail that hand-watering provides. This <u>discussion</u> was uploaded to our ABAS YouTube channel and I am almost always eager to talk shop, so don't hesitate to bring your questions and successes forward next time we see each other. - Ian



What to Work on February

Re-potting continues! Deciduous trees are beginning to leaf out so the priority should be to finish those and then progress to conifers. As we move through February to March, our trees begin the spring push of growth. This is a great time to graft pines and junipers. Most trees will be allowed to grow freely until May/June. The exception is Japanese maples. They should be pinched back to one node (2 leaves) unless the branch is weak or you are trying to thicken it. As your knowledge of bonsai development increases, you will realize that there are nuances to all techniques and methods used to create our living works of art. Be proactive in seeking out knowledge.

SGAAC Japanese Garden Monthly Work

Travis Hendrix has taken the initiative to improve and maintain the ABAS sponsored Japanese garden at the garden center. He has made great progress overall and recently transplanted a long-planned showpiece black pine with help from Phong Nguyen and Paul Newman. After the tree settles for the next 6 - 12 months, branch work, pruning, and repositioning will commence.

While Travis has done an excellent job improving the garden, one person alone cannot keep up with the weeding and other work. Traditionally, work in the Japanese garden was done seasonally, but the increased monthly attention has greatly improved its condition. In anticipation of the March 16 & 17 Spring Sale, we are planning an ad-hoc work session **Saturday March 2**, **9:00 AM to noon**. Bring pruning / gardening tools, shovels, gloves, broom, dust pan, container/ bucket for debris etc. thank you!
