A Note from the Editor



He has been a practicing bonsai artist for over 30 years, conducts workshops and private sessions helping younger enthusiasts and is well known throughout the state as a serious practitioner. He has studied for 15 years with sensei Kenji Miyata as well as George Yamaguchi, Gary Ishii and Mas Ishii. He is a member of Baikoen Bonsai Kenkyukai. Michael is a master of developing intensely ramified deciduous trees with decades of experience, so this is a meeting not to be missed.

In addition, they gave feedback to members' collecting questions, tools to use, planning, aftercare, and yamadori philosophy.

## John Uchida In Memoriam

On November 3, 2022, we lost another pillar of the bonsai community. With the passing of Bonsai Master/Professional John Uchida, the Yamato, Sekiyu Kai and Sierra Bonsai Clubs, of which he was Club Bonsai Master, and the ABAS and other clubs in the bonsai community have lost a truly talented person. He was the owner of Grove Way Bonsai Nursery, Hayward, where for many years, he provided quality bonsai, plants, pots, tools, supplies, and classes/guidance to many who visited his nursery. In addition to on-site instruction at his nursery, Mr. Uchida traveled throughout California and the country, illuminating all with his talent and lightning speed as he transformed plant material into bonsai. Because of his aptitude, skill, and speed he was affectionately dubbed, "Fastest Hands in the West," a label that was readily obvious to everyone who attended his demonstrations. Mr. Uchida was the recipient of the Green and White Award from the Agricultural Society of Japan on November 22, 2021. In past years Mr. Uchida visited ABAS and other Sacramento area clubs several times a year, where his friendly and caring personality was always welcome at workshops and demonstrations. And even though Mr. Uchida was an extremely gifted talent, he was very humble and was often seen attending presentations by other bonsai professionals. To those of us who knew Mr. Uchida, we will sorely miss him. To those who did not have a chance to meet him, you missed knowing a truly unique person.
