Arboreal Abstractions

I love twigs. I have been working in horticulture professionally for over 12 years and my personal obsession with plants runs even deeper. I have a rabid tendency to hoard plants, to never let a plant go in the trash (including plants that belong in the trash). To be fair, they are living organisms and only a monster would indiscriminately toss plants in the rubbish bin.

I love propagation. I have to stick every cutting, collect seeds on every adventure, or survey every urban road median tree for the best spot to air layer. Propagation is a spark that gives me child-like wonder: imagine tender cotyledons emerging from a nascent embryo in suspended animation, against all odds. This is literally what my UC Davis application letter was about.

My dream for years has been to run a nursery. I want to propagate. I want to supply great pre-bonsai. And I really, really want to be a decent bonsai artist. So, more plants is better right? Surely I am fulfilling all of these dreams at once. Hint: nope!

Through a great deal of reflection, it's recently become clear to me that not only are these things not part of the same pursuit, they are at odds with each other most of the time. For now, while living in a suburban tract house, I am coming to terms with the fact that I shouldn't try to run a full-scale nursery out of my back yard. It is a distraction. Anything not related to developing excellent* (I mean excellent in a subjective, not traditionalist way) bonsai is a distraction, if developing excellent bonsai is the goal. Each tree is its own project and the more developed they become, the more it is necessary to maintain a disciplined work schedule. More on this next month.

Foremost, we should grow what makes us happy. I am by no means arguing that every flawed tree is not worth our time. I will keep some of my worst subjects because they tell an important story to me. Yet, as we develop our technique, our eyes become better at recognizing the elements that make a tree that moves us. Inevitably, our definition of what makes a good tree evolves. We hear this wisdom constantly from more experienced artists, from the club, heck I have written it myself, but the process of discovery and developing taste is personal and most of us will have to figure this out at our own speed.

Let me be clear, there will still be a few flats of maple seedlings on my bench, but space is limited and the bar just got raised.

You may obtain your bidder number at the door if you wish to buy from the auction or hold items from the consignment tables. ABAS members may enter up to 5 bonsai / bonsai related items in the auction. Bonsai trees need to be in a pot (not nursery pot) and beyond the pre-bonsai stage. If you plan to sell anything in the auction or consignment sale, contact **Bob Ricker** in advance for a seller number. Print and fill out the consignment sales and/or auction sales sheets prior to the event. Please be sure to follow the instructions carefully to ensure that consignees are paid fairly and that your items don't hold up the check-out process for everyone.

Last Meeting -

Don Dupras: Suiseki & Geology Tuesday August 22

Last month we had the pleasure of Don Dupras presenting on the subjects of suiseki and geology. Don is a retired mining geologist from the California Division of Mines & Geology, author, and devoted rockhound. He brought a fresh subject to the club with undeniable enthusiasm as he explained the geologic story of local rock formations of high interest to California rock collectors.


Don has an especially accessible way of explaining these complex topics to those of us who don't hold higher degrees in the science, while relating them back to the practical aspects of collecting. Topics for the night ranged from accretion of exotic terranes and subduction, to polishing and building stands for rock displays.

There were exquisite suiseki displays brought in for show & tell as well as plenty of "what rock is this?" questions; Don's contagious excitement and curiosity was on display for every example he touched.









What to work on -September

September is the month that we can work on just about everything.

White pines and other high mountain, single flush, pines, (lodgepole, mugo, ponderosa) should be shedding last year's needles. This is the sign that this year's new growth is mature and hardened. It is time to clean up, cut, thin, and wire. Also, this is a good time for heavy pruning and bending.

Black pines and red pines, if they were not decandeled this summer, can be cut, wired and cleaned. If decandled, wait until November/December.

Junipers, cypress, cedars, and other conifers can be cut thinned and wired from now through winter. Heavy pruning and bending is best done after tree growth slows in November.

Broadleaf evergreens can be cut back and wired to continue development. For deciduous trees, we are reaching the end of the window for defoliation and strong cut back. It is OK to prune back long runners that were used for sacrifice to thicken if the branch has reached the desired thickness. Minimal work is needed from now to November when trees lose their leaves and enter winter dormancy.

This was a public outreach event where we had the opportunity to display bonsai, educate the public, and recruit membership.
